Holocaust Studies

Course Overview

Holocaust Studies is a single-semester course that describes the mass murder of millions of Jews during the Nazi rule in Germany and its impact on the international community. In this course, you will trace the history of Jews living in Europe and the origins of anti-Semitism. You will learn about the early life of Hitler and his rise to power. The course also describes how the Nazis exterminated the Jews and how Jews resisted. You will also learn about the liberation of the Jews and the impact of the Holocaust on the non-Jewish community. The course also covers the outcome of post-war trials.

Course Goals

By the end of this course, you will:

- Trace the history of the Jewish community in Europe and describe their way of life.
- Describe the aftermath of World War I leading to the Great Depression.
- Trace the origins of anti-Semitism and explain its role in the rise of the Nazi Party.
- Describe the early life of Adolf Hitler and explain how he rose to power.
- Describe the beginning of the Third Reich era and explain how the Nazis attempted to create a super race.
- Identify and describe the key events of World War II and its consequences.
- Describe the establishment of the ghettos and the living conditions found there.
- Explain the construction of the concentration camps and describe the life of the prisoners at the camps.
- List the objectives of the plan called the Final Solution and explain how it was implemented.
- Explain the establishment of the extermination camps and describe how they operated.
- Describe the resistance shown by the Jewish community and explain how they were liberated from the Nazis.
- Explain the impact of the Holocaust on non-Jewish people.
- Explain the significance and the outcome of various post-war trials.
- Explain the impact of the Holocaust on the international community and how the victims went about rebuilding their lives.

Module. <i>Each module in this course contains an interactive tutorial and an associated mastery test. Tutorials may include one or more Lesson Activities that constitute tasks associated with the tutorial. The module score comes from a student's score on the mastery test.</i>	14	30%
Discussion. <i>Online discussions allow for higher-order thinking about terminal objectives. An online threaded discussion mirrors the educational experience of a classroom discussion. Teachers can initiate a discussion by asking a complex, open-ended question. Students can engage in the discussion by responding both to the question and to the thoughts of others. Each unit in a course has one predefined discussion topic; teachers may add more discussion topics.</i>	5	25%
Course Activity. <i>Course Activities are similar to Unit Activities in scope but may be found at any point in the course, either to prepare the student for new learning or to act as a performance-based activity required for a learning objective. Like Unit Activities, Course Activities include simple rubrics, and sample answers are available for teachers. Course Activities are teacher graded.</i>	5	25%
End of Semester Test. <i>The end of semester test (EOS) appears at the end of the course. Students are delivered a few items from every tutorial in the course in order to assess the major course objectives.</i>	1	20%
